

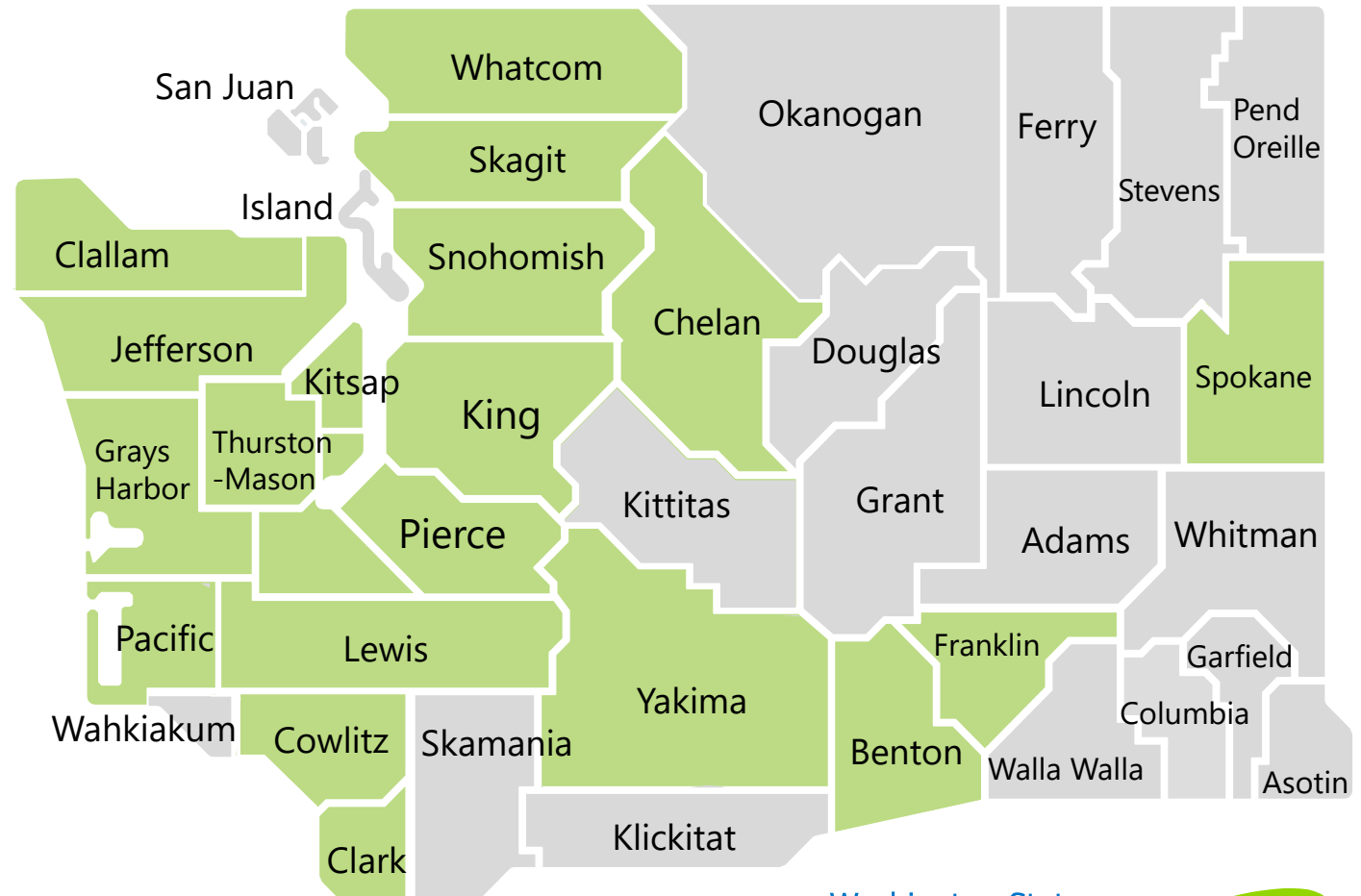

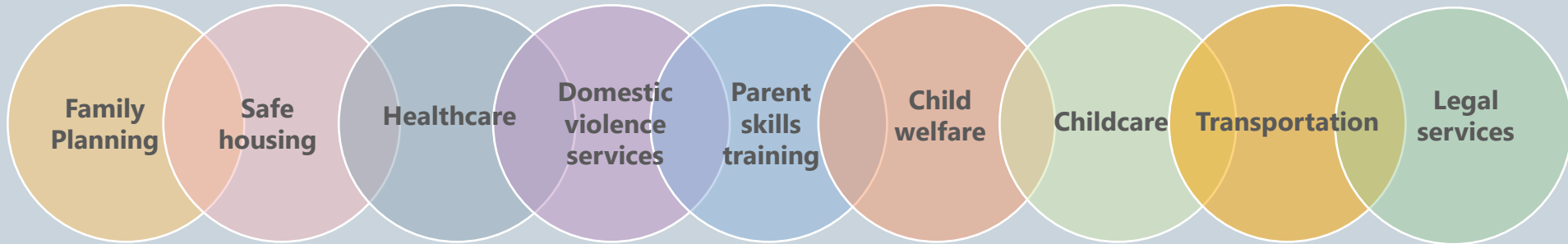
Parent-Child Assistance Program (PCAP)

- ▶ 3-year intensive case management program
- ▶ 15 PCAP locations
- ▶ Serving 20 counties
- ▶ 1,490 client slots contracted
- ▶ Medicaid and State funded



Parent-Child Assistance Program services

Assistance in accessing and using local resources



Referral, support, and advocacy for substance use disorder treatment and continuing care.



Linkages to health care and appropriate therapeutic interventions for children.



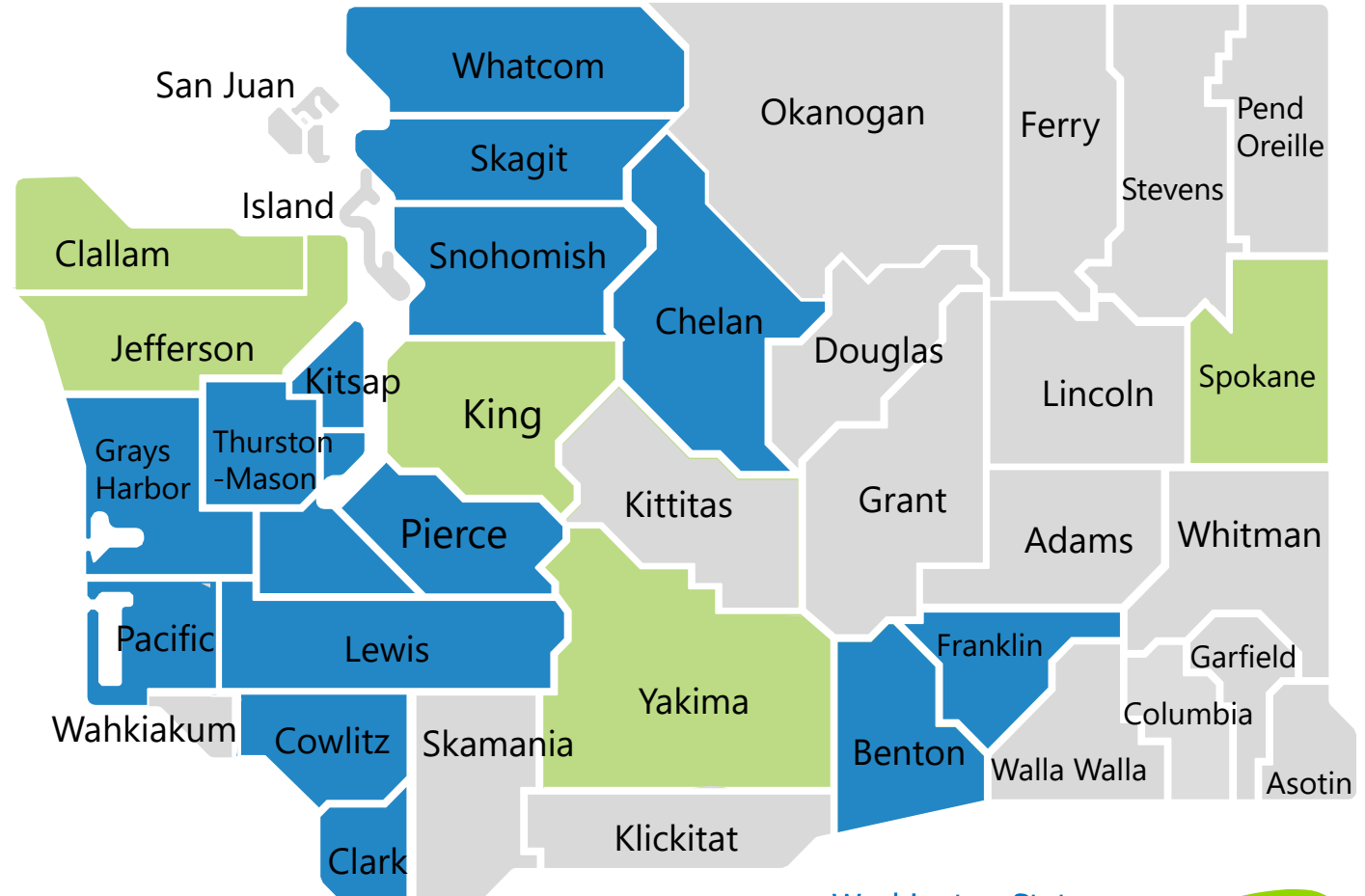
Timely advocacy based on client needs.

- ▶ Formerly known as the Fetal Alcohol and Drug Unit (FADU)
- ▶ Seattle, WA – University of Washington
- ▶ Provides to all PCAP sites around the state:
 - ▶ Quality Assurance
 - ▶ Implementation Fidelity
 - ▶ Staff Training
 - ▶ Program Data Collection and Evaluation
- ▶ Reports to DBHR:
 - ▶ Monthly PCAP Updates
 - ▶ Annual PCAP Report

DCYF dedicated PCAP slots

- ▶ HCA and DCYF interagency agreement
- ▶ Substance Exposed Newborn (SEN) diagnosis
- ▶ Clallam-Jefferson, King, Yakima, Spokane PCAP sites
- ▶ Each site dedicates 14 client slots

Budget overview PCAP Rate Increase

ESSB 5187, Sec 215 (46):

\$505,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal year 2024

\$1,011,000 of the general fund—state appropriation for fiscal year 2025

\$1,095,000 of the general fund—federal appropriation

Increase rates by 15 percent

Effective January 1, 2024

Proviso language Sec. 215 (108)

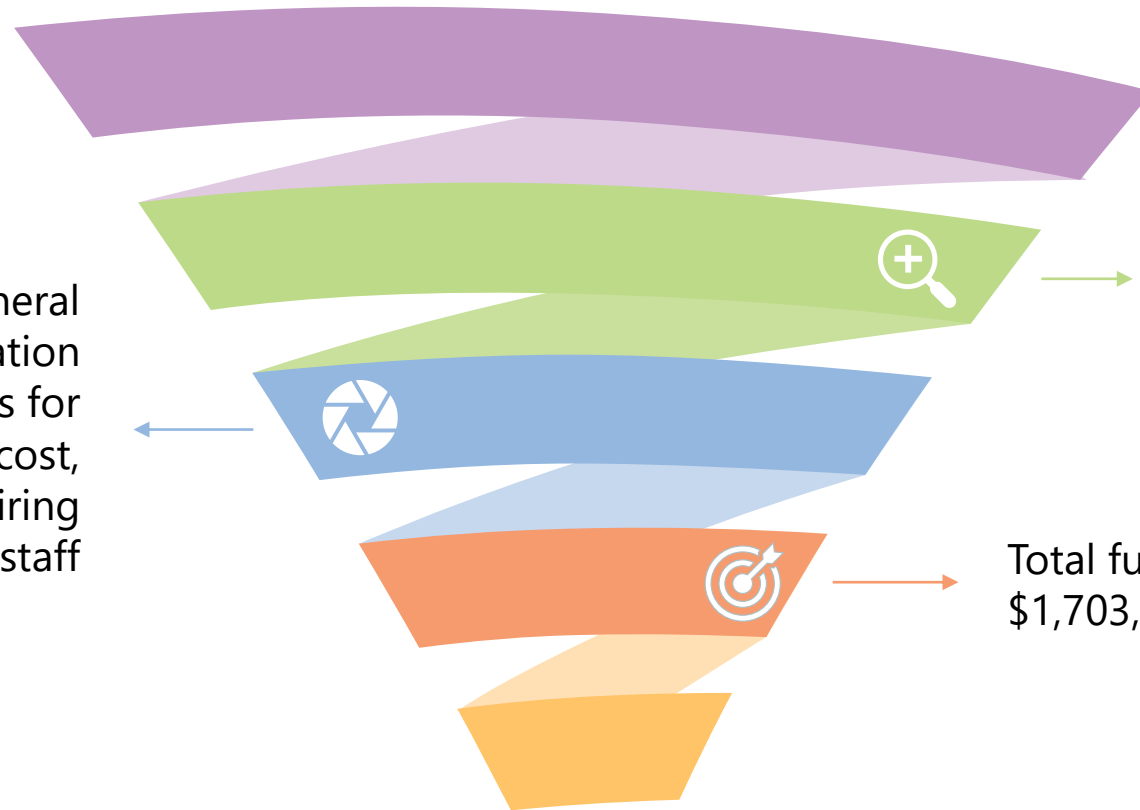
16-bed substance use disorder residential treatment facility in Grays Harbor County, specializing in treating pregnant and parenting individuals, using a family preservation model.



The authority must contract for these services through behavioral health entities in a manner that allows leveraging of federal Medicaid funds to pay for a portion of the costs.

Operating budget section 125 proviso 108

\$568,000 of the general fund—federal appropriation for the fiscal year 2025 is for documented start up cost, including recruitment, hiring and training of staff



\$1,135,000 of the general fund — state appropriation for fiscal year 2025

Total funding for this project: \$1,703,000

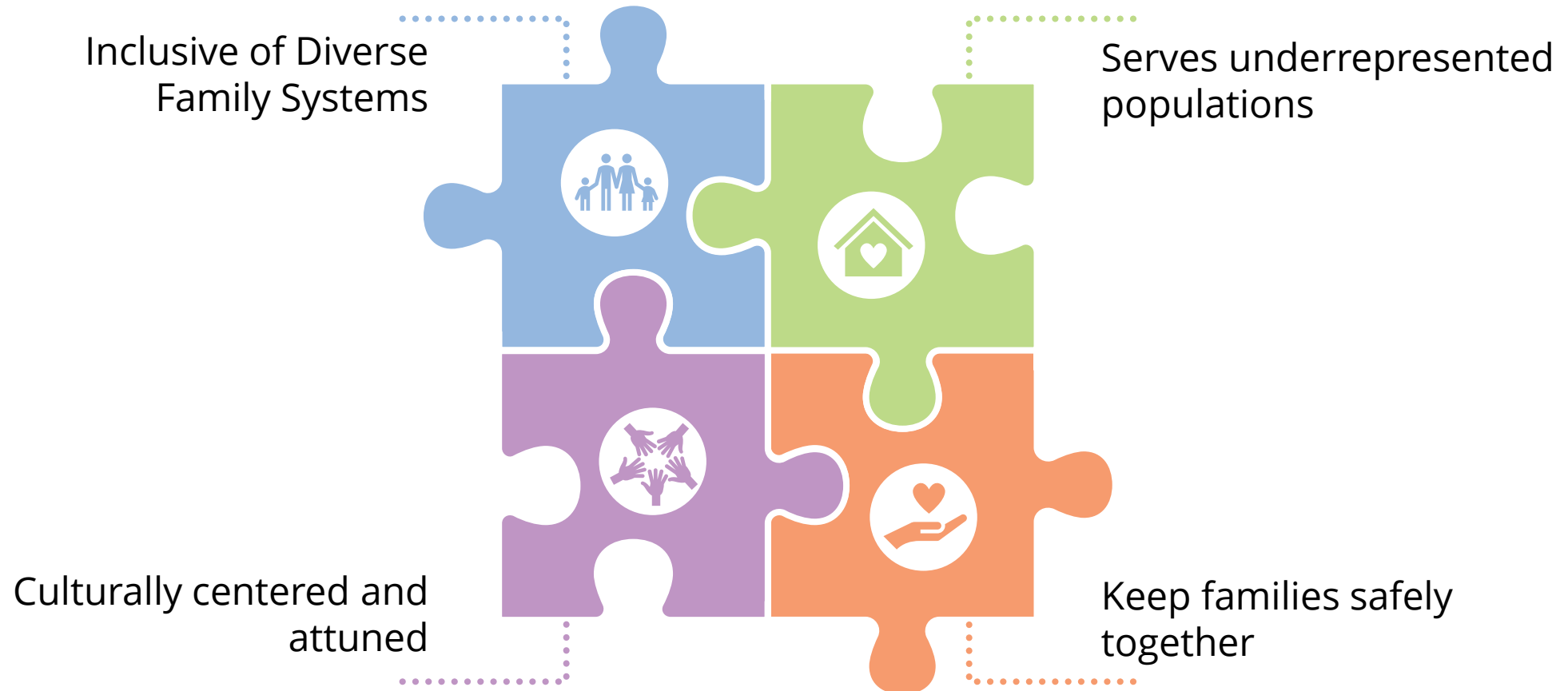

Operational components of a Family Preservation Model

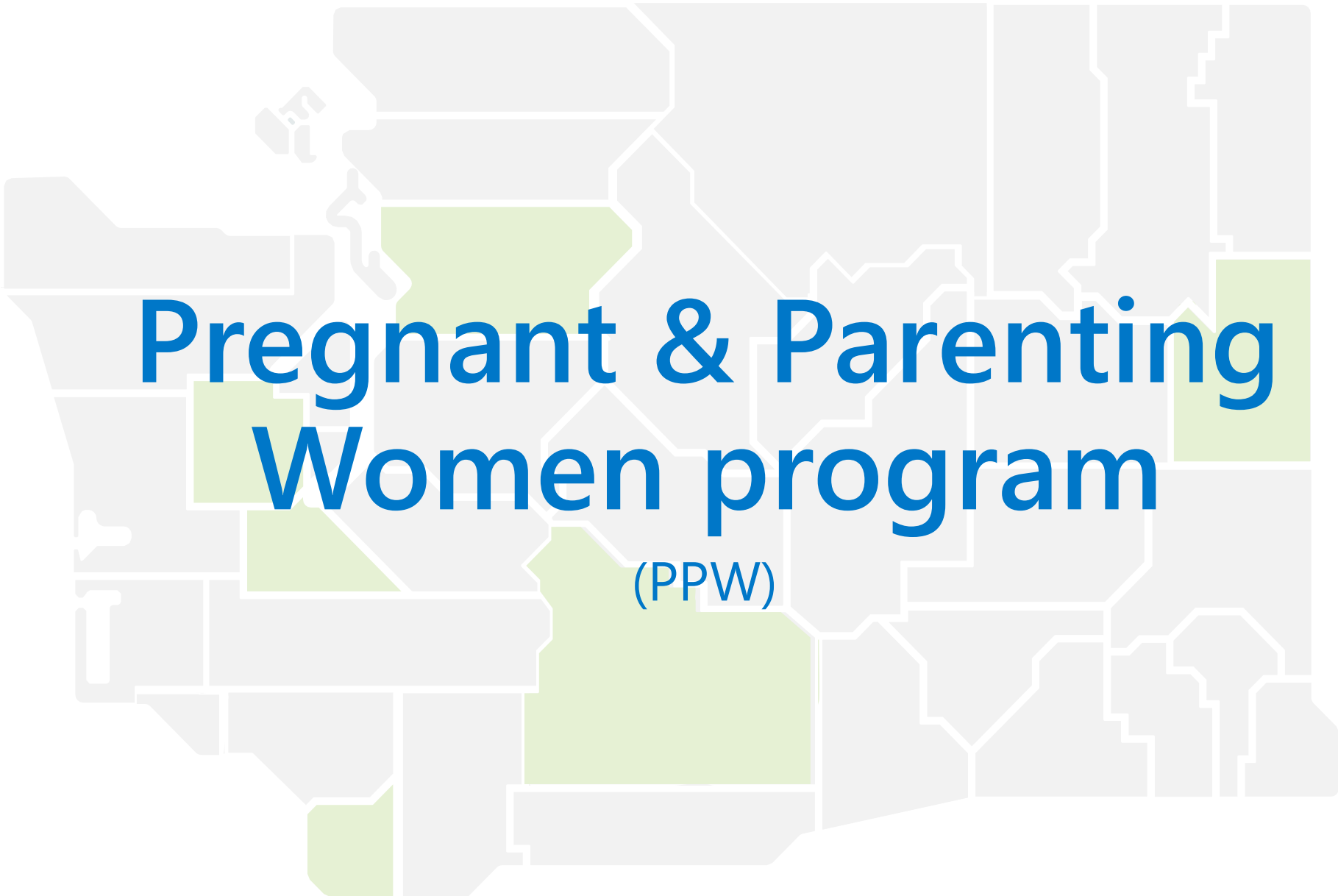


Status
